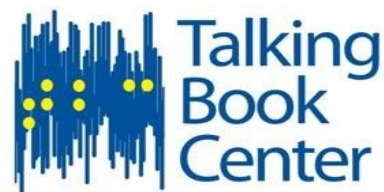

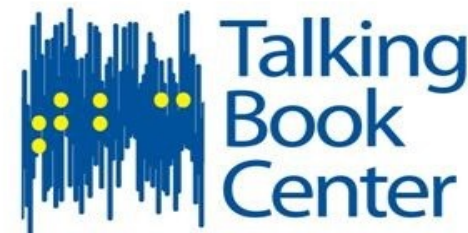

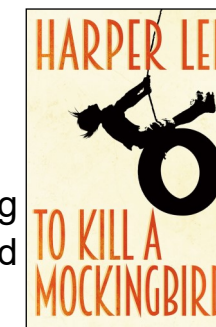

Banned Books Week: September 26 - October 2:

Banned Book Week is an annual awareness campaign promoted by the American Library Association that celebrates the freedom to read.

DB77672 To Kill A Mockingbird by Harper Lee. This Pulitzer Prize-winning novel, written in 1960, considered an American classic, was challenged and banned because of offensive language and violence.



DB48515 Of Mice and Men by John Steinbeck. Written in 1937, this novel was challenged and banned because of offensive language and violence.



DB56351 One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest by Ken Kesey. Published in 1962, this novel was challenged and banned due to language and violence

DB68308 Grapes of Wrath by John Steinbeck. Written in 1939, this novel set during the Great Depression, won the National Book Award and the Pulitzer Prize. It was banned for language and political themes. Steinbeck received the Nobel Prize in Literature in 1962.



DB38959 Animal Farm by George Orwell. This satire, written in 1945, was banned for its social and political themes.

DB34963 Fahrenheit 451 by Ray Bradbury. Written in 1953, this dystopian novel was banned for language. This classic is set in the not-so-distant future in which intellectual thought and books are illegal!
