Twelve-year-old Nozomi's understanding of the bombing of Hiroshima in 1945 is transformed when she learns how those she loves were affected by the event.

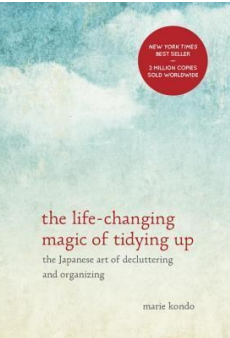

Caracas, Venezuela. Adelaida Falcón buries her beloved mother, leaving her alone in a city very different from the one in which she was raised. Food shortages, protestors attacked with tear gas, and militants that kidnap people threaten her daily existence. Translated from Spanish.

DB90457 The Invention Of Ana by Mikkel Rosengaard (human relations)
Newly arrived in New York from Copenhagen, a young writer meets Romanian immigrant Ana Ivan. Ana soon pulls him into her world; she tries to alter her sense of time by following the astronomical calendar. Translated from Danish.

Private Investigator Joe King Oliver was framed for assault by someone within the police force. A decade later, he receives a card from a woman admitting she was paid to frame him. King investigates. Meanwhile, a radical journalist is accused of killing two corrupt police officers. Violence, strong language, and descriptions of sex. 2018

Marion, a young woman abandoned by her husband, makes friends at work with Louise and Ginny. Before long, they are attending parties and entertaining powerful men.
