



Who are we?

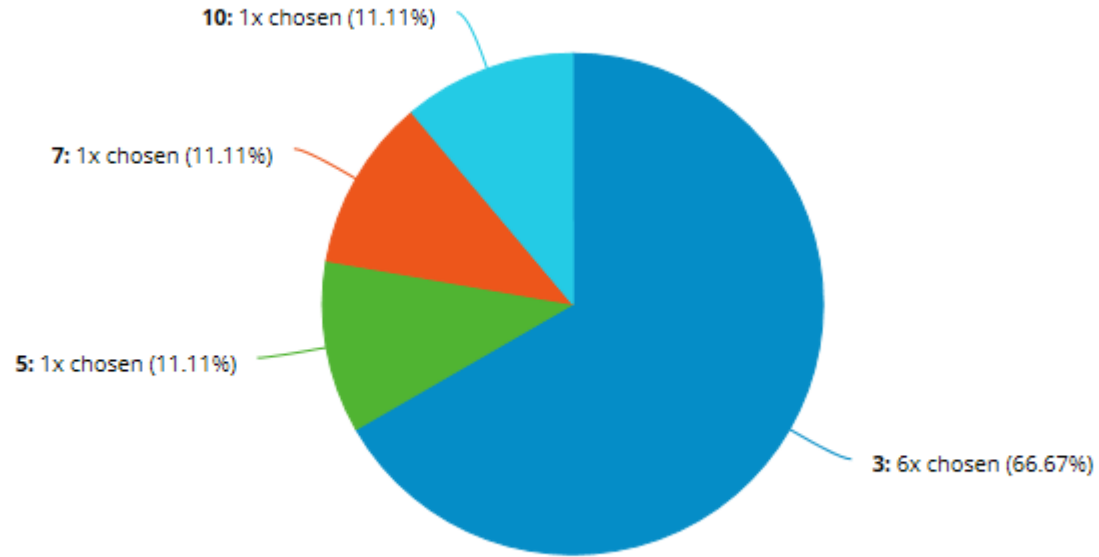

OOY staff accomplish this through a balance of direct service to youth and active support of other government and community agencies.

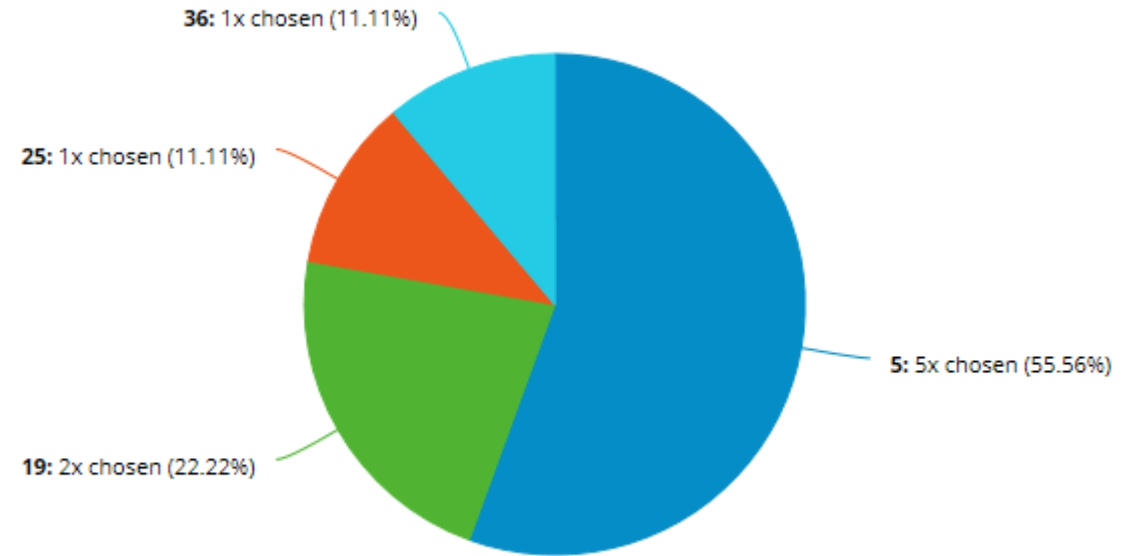

How many staff does work for the OOH?



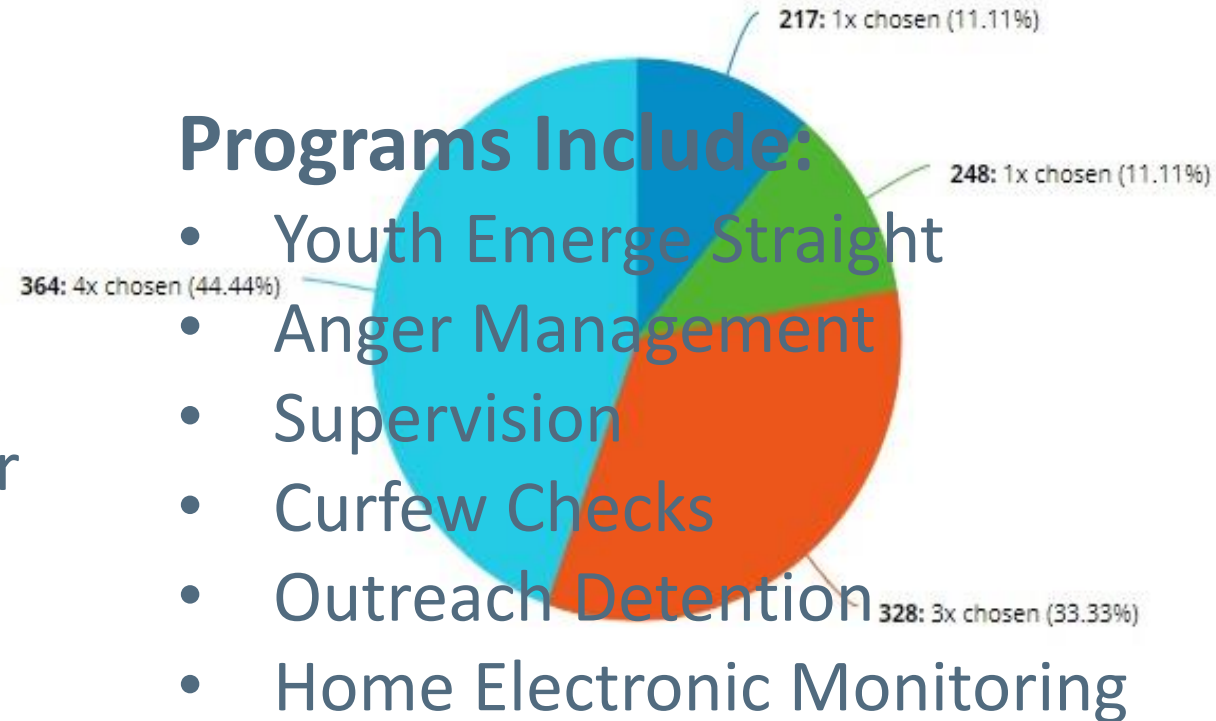


Crime Control

Since 1996 The Office on Youth has received consecutive funding under The Virginia Juvenile Community Crime Control Act (VJCCCA).

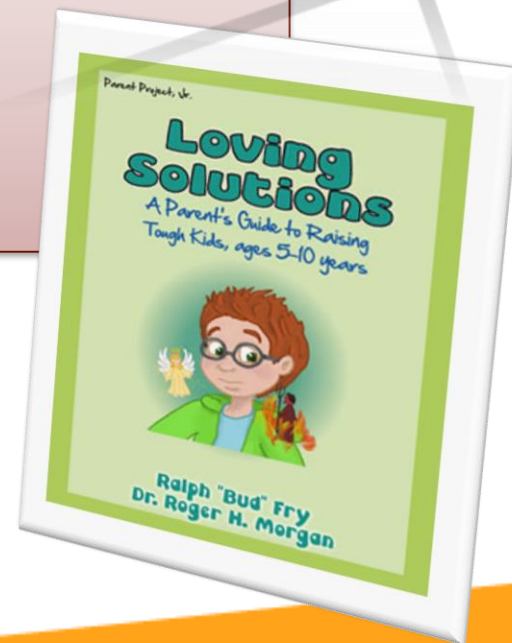
Programs Include:

- Home Electronic Monitoring

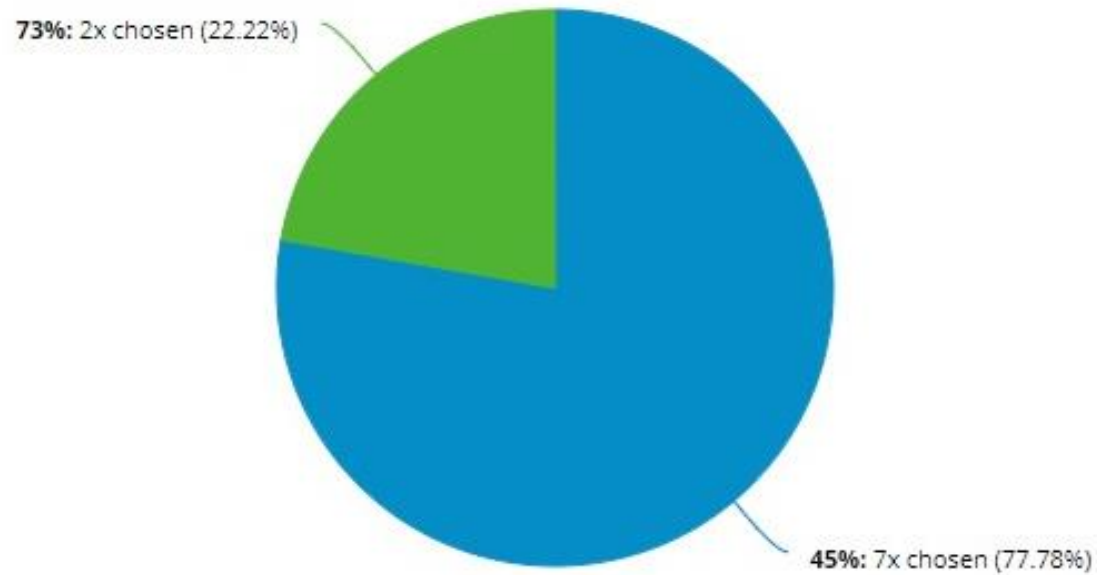




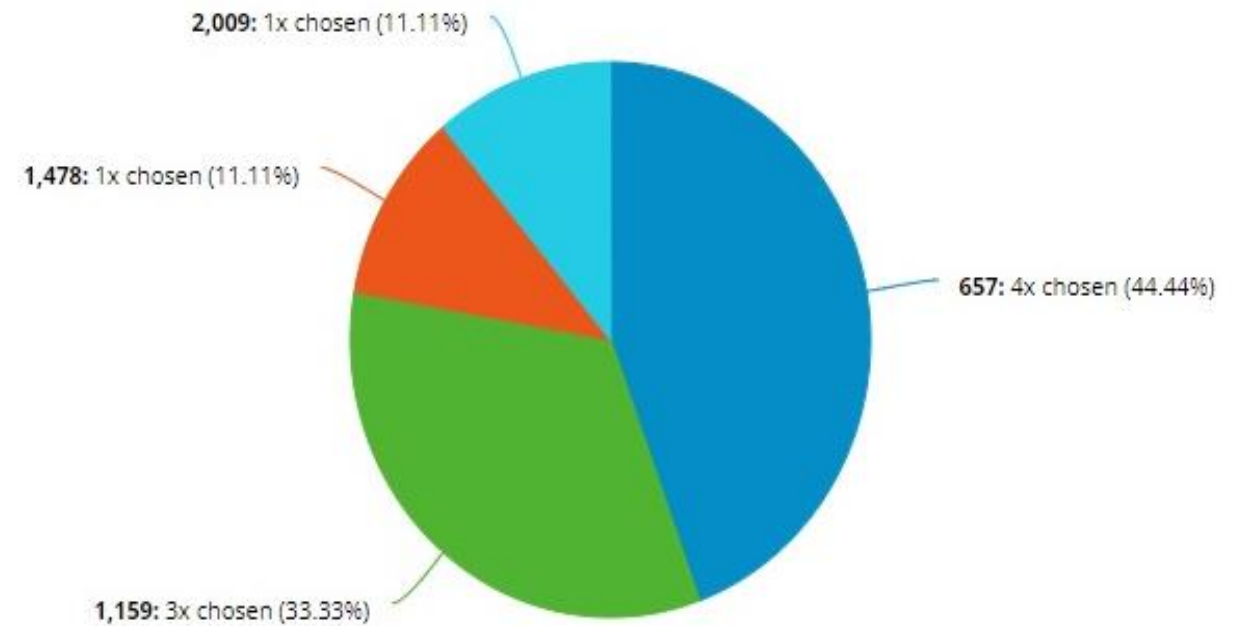
Office on Youth Parenting Programs

Truancy Intervention

- 1,478 students in Staunton, Waynesboro, & Augusta County were considered truant in the last 2 school years
- Currently working with 5 area high schools and 2 middle schools
- Monitor and Mentor
 - Check and Connect
 - Absences, Tardies, Grades, Detention, etc.
 - Phone Calls, Meetings, Goal Setting, Problem Solving, Community connections and resources....



Youth Corps - Summer Employment

- 6 week summer employment for youth 16-18 years old
- Summer 2018
 - 15 Applicants
 - 8 Participants
 - 5 worksites throughout our service area.
- 25 hours per week / \$7 per hour
- Educational Sessions
 - Filling out a resume
 - Job Interview Skills
 - Money Management/Bank Account



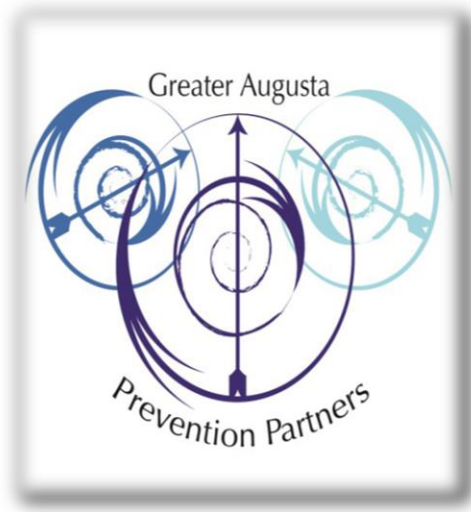

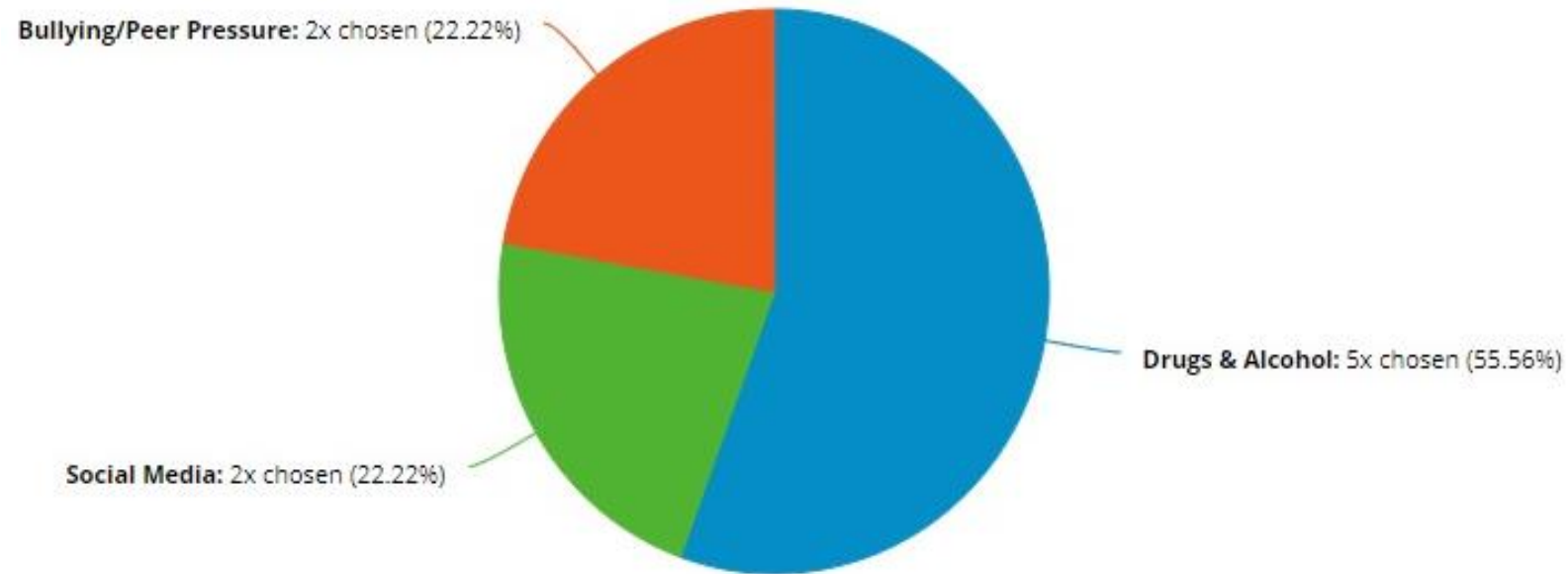

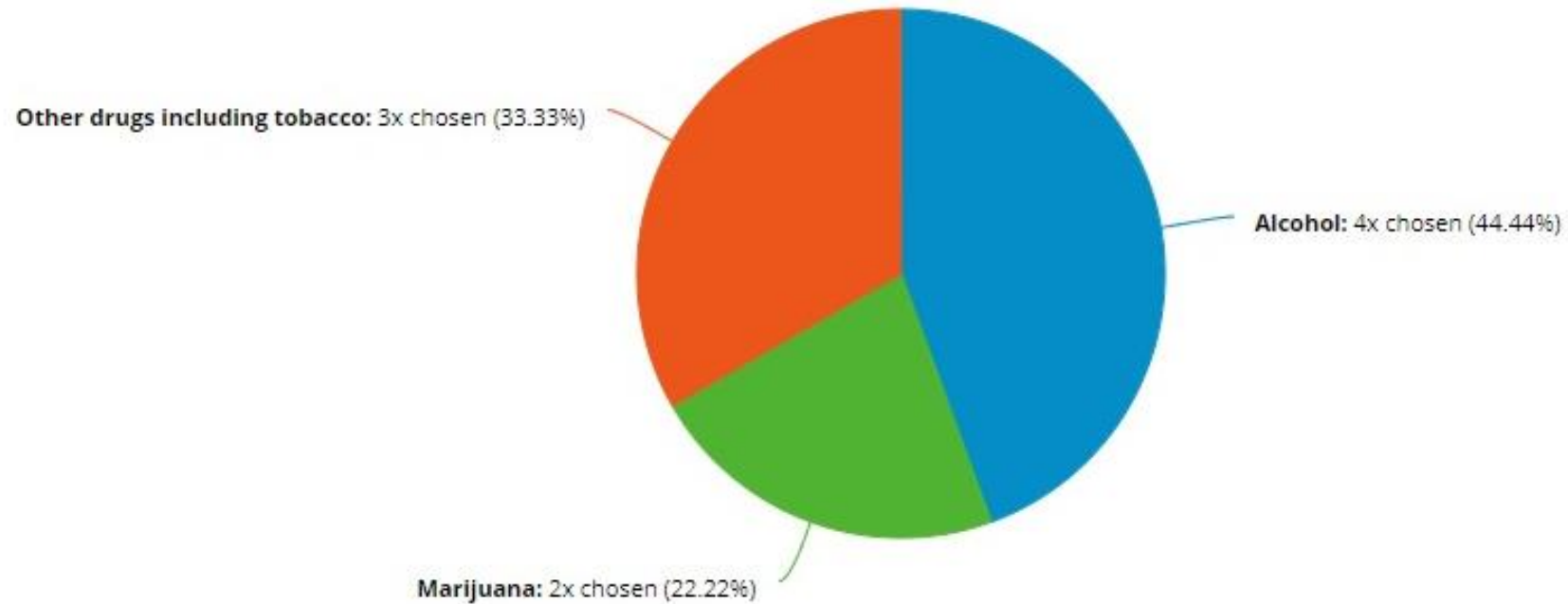
Meth and Marijuana are identified by the Skyline Drug Task Force as being the most prevalent drugs in our communities.

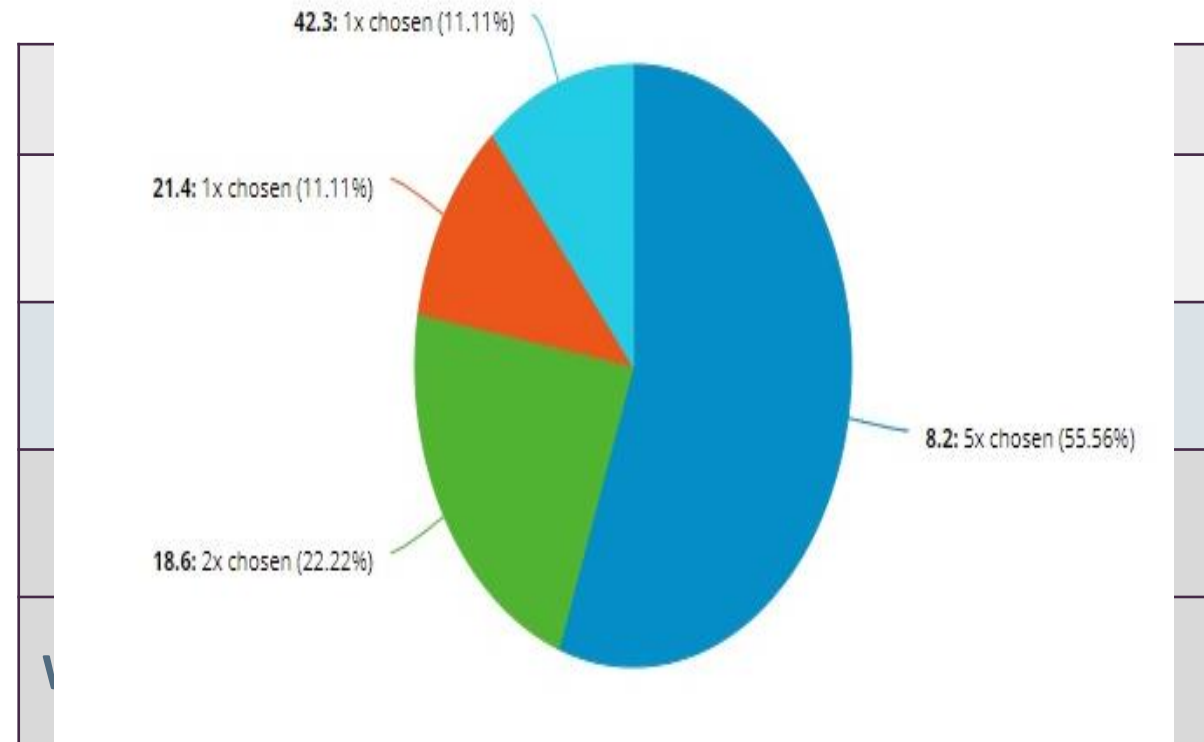


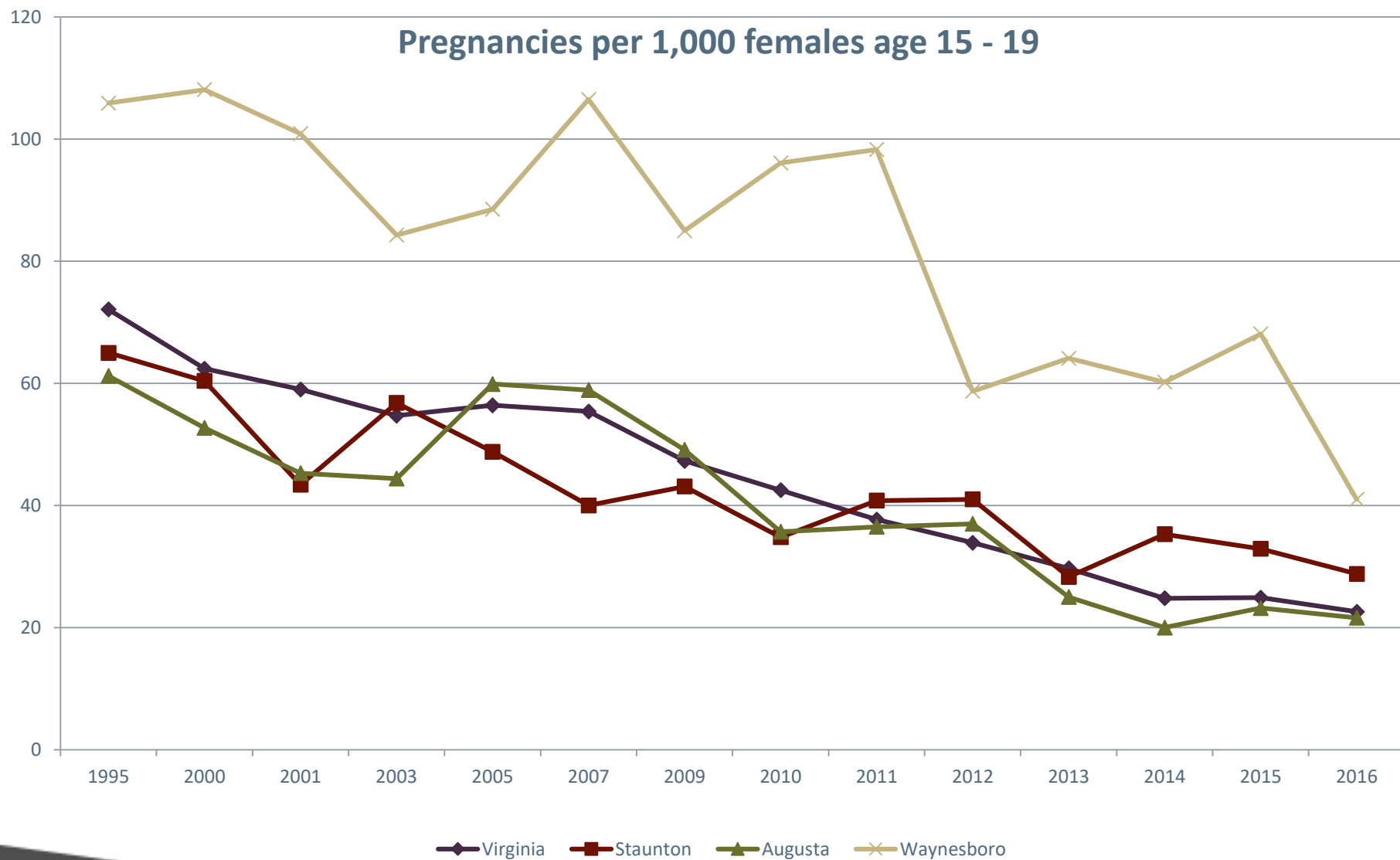
Teen Pregnancy Prevention

2016 Pregnancies per 1,000 females by age:

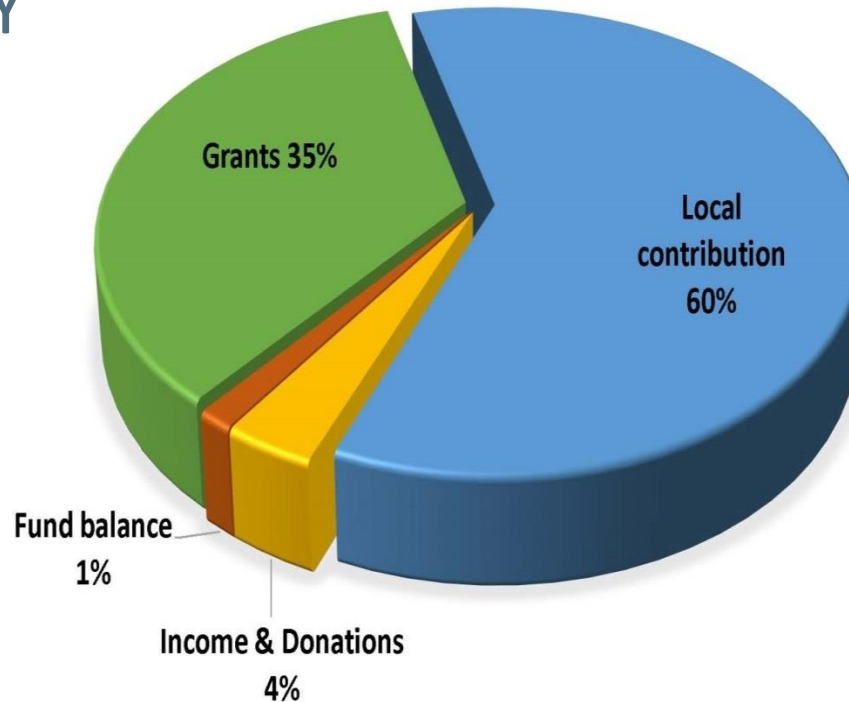




For every dollar given by local municipalities, the OOH leveraged an additional \$ 0.64 in FY17.



FY17 SOURCES OF INCOME

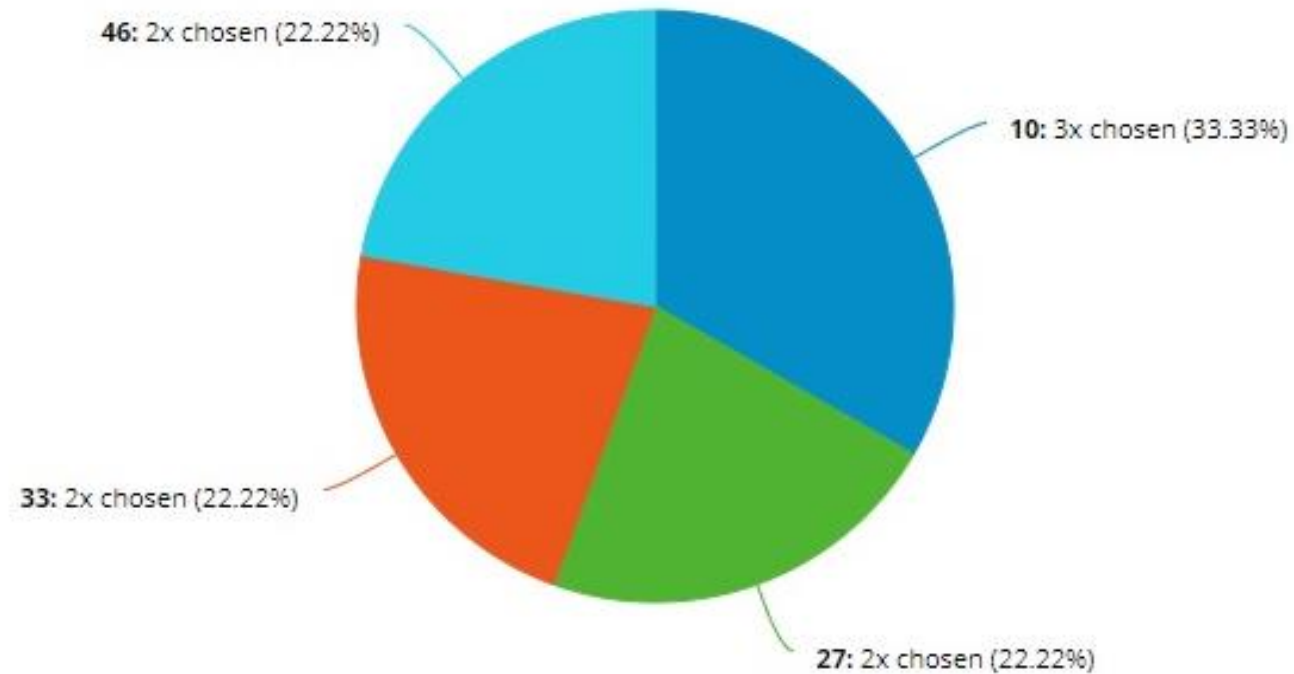


Localities provided an average of \$73/ youth served.

Accomplishments:

- The OOH supported 21 different Government Departments and 25 Non-Profit agencies.
- 90% of Parents enrolled in an OOH class completed the program compared to 60% nationally.
- Crime Control Case manager provided support services for the Court Service Unit to a total of 184 youth for 3,754 contact hours.
- 145 community members attended the two community meetings/presentations on drugs and opioids.
- Approximately 3,200 community members and students received information from our office at community events and health fairs.
- Office on Youth staff collectively participated in 590 hours of in person or webinar training.
- Youth Programming [Resource Inventory](#) completed in 2017.
- Youth and Family Needs Assessment being released in November 2018.
